This year, our Kids Klub administrative team saw a big change - we moved to a new location! Our Home Office relocated from Pawtucket to Smithfield. Building our students' technological literacy and providing new experiences has always been important to Kids Klub. This year, each site purchased a Kindle Fire for student use. These Kindles have been used for reading, learning and educational apps and games.

Our summer learning program has continued to progress in North Providence. Students attending our Kids Klub sites in North Smithfield and Woonsocket had the opportunity to participate in summer camps at Dr. Day Care Learning Center.

Enrichment Programs have continued to be a huge success at Kids Klub! Families and children are enjoying the wide variety of enrichment options.

The Klub House Rock! Annual Fundraiser was a great event in 2018! This year's event had increased connections with the community as we celebrated together at a wine and beer tasting, as well as raffles and silent auctions.

During April break, Kids Klub students made paper airplanes with dollar bills, "Flying Dollars," to see which one could fly the farthest, while also learning about giving back to the community! The winner was Josiah from Kids Klub Whelan. There were 36 participants, Josiah won half (\$18) and he donated the remaining dollars to the Friends of the North Providence Animal Shelter!



KIDS KLUB PROGRAMS

BEFORE SCHOOL

start the day right

Mornings are filled with activities to help "wake the brain" as children arrive and begin their day. Students are given the opportunity to choose activities based on their interests and engage in structured activities. A nutritious breakfast is included in the cost of tuition. Homework assistance is always available.

AFTER SCHOOL

educational & fun

Kids Klub staff ensure all children arrive at the site after school ends. Students complete "brain break" activities and enjoy a nutritious snack. Homework assistance and tutoring take place every day after school. Kids Klub provides an opportunity for physical activity each day through a designated time to focus on health, wellness, and fitness.





FULL DAY & VACATION

hands on learning experiences

Kids Klub offers learning opportunities all year round! During school vacations or summer months, our programs offer a wide variety of STEAM curriculum, hands-on learning experiences, field trips, site visitors, and service learning.

Summer learning is a great way for children to not only make lifelong friends but to also mitigate summer learning loss while they are out of school! Our summer programs include a nutritious breakfast, lunch, and snack each day. Children stay active and fit by participating in many activities both indoors and outdoors.

FOCUS ON ACAPEMICS





An academic focus is very important to Kids Klub. Every afternoon, students receive homework support and/or tutoring. During this time, students are given the opportunity to work with a Kids Klub teacher in a small group setting. In addition, Kids Klub encourages peer-to-peer collaboration between the students to assist with learning. After students have completed their homework, there is time designated for journal writing and reading.


Kids Klub's curriculum is designed to engage students from grades K through 5. Activities are developmentally appropriate using a mixture of grouping styles (i.e. free choice, small group, large group, individual activities) based on age, interest, and ability. The curriculum is developed by a team of school age professionals that meet monthly to assess outcomes and objectives of the program using the RIPQA Tool and aligning with Common Core. Kids Klub's Educational Enrichment Coordinator oversees the curriculum, enrichment activities and the educational field trips. Kids Klub has an Educational Concepts Framework for the year which lists monthly themes and topics of study. A monthly calendar is created from the Educational Concepts Framework to provide activities to help students become more familiar with the theme. Copies of these are made available each month so that if a suggestion or feedback is given, Kids Klub can incorporate feedback to strengthen the program.

MONTHLY CURRICULUM



Teachers complete weekly lesson plans aligned to both Common Core and the Kids Klub curriculum. Our curriculum is revised annually based on teacher and parent feedback to inform our annual Educational Concepts Framework.

The first day of each month the KWL (K-Know, W-Want to know, L-Learned) Chart is created. This assesses the students' knowledge on the monthly idea and is updated throughout the month.

Two exploration days are planned each month to explore the students' interests based on discussion of the KWL Chart.

The third Wednesday of each month is dedicated to anti-bullying activities, using the Teaching Tolerance curriculum.

The last Friday of each month will incorporate a STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art & Math) activity.











465 HOURS OF STEAM LEARNING

Throughout Kids Klub's monthly curriculum and enrichments, STEAM is incorporated. The children use math when they are measuring during cooking, and science for mixing materials together. During music they use math to count notes. The children use art and math when they are creating three dimensional objects. Students use technology with the use of the site tablets for educational learning and researching. These curriculum activities reinforce the knowledge and skills needed for in-school success.



ABOUT HSLI SUMMER LEARNING

"BECOMING OUR BEST SELVES: THROUGH ENGINEERING, LITERACY, SCIENCE, AND SERVICE LEARNING"

The Hasbro Summer Learning Initiative (HSLI) Grant is awarded to programs that make it imperative to have service learning at their Summer Learning Program as well as reduce learning loss over the summer. This grant, with the collaboration of North Providence School Department (NPSD), has offered Kids Klub the opportunity to work alongside NPSD teachers who educate and assess approximately 65 4th through 6th grade students over a 6-week program.

Kids Klub collaborates with the RI Afterschool Network (formerly known as the Afterschool Leadership Circle), a statewide network of Rhode Islanders who support quality afterschool and summer learning opportunities for young people. The RI Afterschool Network encourages all educators to rethink how, when, and where children and youth learn to ensure their success.





LEARNING POES NOT JUST HAPPEN IN A CLASSROOM.



Colt State Park

Summer is a unique opportunity to provide hands-on learning opportunities for children that are both academic and fun. Summertime is when the very real phenomenon called "summer learning loss" occurs if children and youth are not engaged in active learning.

Research demonstrates that all children, regardless of their socioeconomic status, lose up to two months of math computational skills, while children from lower-income situations also may lose up to two months of reading skills. Kids Klub's focus on summer learning helps prevent the summer slide!

NORTH PROVIDENCE SUMMER PROGRAM RESULTS

As part of the North Providence Kids Klub HSLI summer program, students who will be entering 5th grade and above in the fall participate in a pre and post online survey. This is called the Survey of Academic and Youth Outcomes-Youth (SAYO-Y).

Of the approximately 65 students who attended the North Providence Kids Klub HSLI summer program, 30 students completed anonymous pre/post surveys. The pre-survey was completed during week one of the program and the post-survey during week six.

The survey results measure the 30 North Providence Kids Klub participants compared to 416 overall summer participants (including the North Providence Kids Klub data).



Students are asked to answer questions on a scale of 1 to 4 that focus on youth development domains as well as questions about their program experiences.

Youth in the Kids Klub program experienced the greatest gain in **Opportunity to Plan and Lead** (+17%)

Youth in the Kids Klub program scored the highest in "Taught me that working hard in school will help me reach my goals" and "Taught me that going to school is important for my future"



ABOUT SERVICE LEARNING



The students made backpacks filled with school supplies, for the start of the school year. They were passed out to each of the North Providence elementary schools to distribute to families.

Kids Klub encourages the development of life skills, respect for others, and positive social interactions through a variety of service learning projects and programs. Service Learning is a hands-on and student-centered approach to learning, through instruction and reflection, which provides a meaningful experience to community service. This process is important to Kids Klub, in showing students how they can make an impact in their own communities, no matter how large or small, while also teaching leadership skills and responsibility.


Through our partnership and grant with HSLI, Kids Klub authentically and robustly makes service learning the core of our curriculum. Children and youth, over the course of a six-week, thirty-day program, become advocates in their own learning. The curriculum's focus on service learning allows children and youth to become more aware of their community by identifying

issues and concerns, and then creating active solutions that ultimately lead to stronger civic engagement.

In 2018, the North Providence Kids Klub Hasbro Summer Learning program's service learning project was to help the homeless. The students held two bake sales, with donated goods, and a car wash to raise money for the homeless community. A group of senior campers also delivered food drive boxes around the North Providence community, to collect non-perishable items.

At this year's culminating event, the students held a carnival of homemade games at their camp site, Greystone Elementary School, where a non-perishable item or donation was asked for admission, as well as raffle items. There was a huge turnout with school department officials, local leaders, the Mayor, family and friends.



STUDENT-LED SERVICE LEARNING

Allowing students to evaluate and choose a service learning project is important to Kids Klub. This year's service learning project was to help the homeless community, adhering to our overall theme of health and "Becoming Our Best Selves: Through Engineering, Literacy, Science, and Service Learning," theme. After the students brainstormed their ideas and they were narrowed down to helping with homelessness and hunger, the students divided themselves into different committees: fundraising, advertising, food drive, and designing a carnival for the culminating event.



The students then divided themselves into committees. The fundraising group was in charge of holding two bake sales and a car wash where all proceeds would help the homeless. The food drive committee created boxes to collect non-perishable items, researched items people could donate, and delivered boxes in the community to collect the non-perishable items. The advertising committee created invitations for the bake sales, car wash, and carnival culminating event, and went into the community hand delivering these invitations. They wrote thank you letters to any places that donated to their cause. The carnival group created homemade games out of recycled materials for patrons to play at the culminating event, where admission would be a non-perishable item or donation. A small group of students also created a Public Service Announcement about homelessness and how you can help. A group of students also shopped on a budget at Walmart during camp, where they bought items to create Blessing Bags, and backpacks with school supplies.

Through the children's effort, they raised a total of \$850! Gift cards for Stop & Shop were purchased and distributed to the North Providence School District Food Pantry (as well as collected non-perishable items), Amos House (along with collected toiletries), Kent Center (along with the Blessing Bags), and Operation Stand Down in Johnston. The 24 backpacks filled with school supplies were distributed to each North Providence elementary school, giving them to families in need.

The students recognized that some of their own friends might be homeless or struggling, so made plans to continue raising funds throughout the school year.


IMPACT STORIES MAKING A PIFFERENCE

He came up to the staff and asked since we had been working on helping the homeless for our service learning project, if we could go give the man extra food from lunch. The staff thought it was a great idea and went with him and a few kids to give the man the extra food. As we walked across the street, Anthony was nervous but excited to put what we had been learning into action. The man was very appreciative of the food thanking them. On the way back to the park, Anthony looked at the staff and said, "I feel really good about what we just did. Everyone deserves a second chance." And with that, we knew he understood what it meant to take part in service learning to its fullest.



ola has been in Kids Klub since she was 7 years old and our summer learning program for the past 3 years that she could attend, graduating on to middle school after the summer. While Nola's personality is much of a social butterfly, she would interact mostly with her group of friends from the past years. When looking at her ecomap after the pre-assessment, it showed just that with mostly connections to friends and teachers she knew from Kids Klub or school. One day, Nola discussed with the Camp Administrator how she hoped she could come back next year as Peer Leader stating, "It's fun being here and not on my phone or computer all day at home. It also helps me socialize with other people I've never met before, and get to know people other than my little group and help me make more friends, and find more of my interests. And also, someone here always makes sure I'm doing well." What Nola felt was shown on paper when it came time to make the post-ecomap, showing stronger connections she made with people she had already known, but also new connections with students and adults. She had built relationships and felt safe branching out to new people. We couldn't be prouder of her maturity over the years, and being a great role model to her peers.
